<u>FLMJ and Minister for Immigration and Border Protection</u> (Citizenship) [2016] AATA 454 (30 June 2016); Dr L Bygrave, Member

Citizenship – conferral of Australian Citizenship – whether applicant of good character – domestic violence offences – driving offences – insufficient time has passed – decision under review affirmed

Ozturk and Minister for Immigration and Border Protection (Citizenship) [2016] AATA 489 (13 July 2016); Deputy President JW Constance

Citizenship by conferral – good character – whether the Applicant satisfies the legislative requirement to be shown to be of good character – where applicant has previously resided unlawfully in Australia – where applicant has previous traffic offences – whether any mitigating factors or explanations outweigh the behaviour in question – decision set aside and remitted

<u>Devlin and Australian Postal Corporation</u> (Compensation) [2016] AATA 487 (7 June 2016); Senior Member E Fice

Workers' compensation – interlocutory application – extension of time to lodge application for review – explanation for delay – prejudice – reasonable prospects of success – application refused

Talevski and K & S Freighters Pty Ltd (Compensation) [2016] AATA 492 (13 July 2016); Senior Member Ms N Isenberg

Incapacity to work – whether offer of suitable employment made – return to work plan – whether unreasonable failure to take up offer of suitable employment – decision under review set aside and substituted

<u>Tera Euna and Minister for Immigration and Border Protection</u> (Migration) [2016] AATA 301 (11 May 2016); Senior Member Mrs JC Kelly

Class TY Subclass 444 Special Category (Temporary) visa – criminal offences – cancellation of visa – Direction 65 – character test – protection of Australian community – best interests of minor children – whether risk of future harm to Australian community unacceptable – history of violent criminal conduct – significant risk of reoffending – decision affirmed

<u>Toelau Hohua and Minister for Immigration and Border Protection</u> (Migration) [2016] AATA 486 (12 July 2016); Senior Member CR Walsh

Decision to not revoke a mandatory cancellation of Applicant's Class TY Subclass 444 Special Category (Temporary) visa – Applicant not of "good character" – Applicant has a "substantial criminal record" – Applicant sentenced to a term of imprisonment of 12 months or more – whether there is any other reason why mandatory visa cancellation decision should be revoked – decision under review affirmed

National Disability Insurance Scheme

McGarrigle and National Disability Insurance Agency [2016] AATA 498 (15 July 2016); Senior Member JF Toohey

Applicant a participant in the NDIS – autism spectrum disorder – intellectual disability – reasonable and necessary supports – transport costs – taxis – whether total cost should be funded – what is reasonable to expect families, carers, informal networks and the community to provide – decision under review affirmed

Social Security

Ellis and Secretary, Department of Social Services (Social services second review) [2016] AATA 490 (13 July 2016); Deputy President Dr C Kendall

Mobility Allowance – travel test – handicap – inability to use public transport without substantial assistance due to disability – gainful employment – vocational training – volunteer work – vocational rehabilitation program – decision under review affirmed

Veterans' Affairs

<u>Kidd and Repatriation Commission</u> (Veterans' entitlements) [2016] AATA 485 (8 July 2016); Senior Member JF Toohey

Whether morbid obesity related to service – whether hypertension related to service – whether veteran entitled to special rate – whether veteran prevented from continuing in remunerative employment by accepted disabilities alone – decision under review affirmed

<u>Watson and Repatriation Commission</u> (Veterans' entitlements) [2016] AATA 408 (20 June 2016); Senior Member PW Taylor SC

Application for disability pension – post traumatic stress disorder – depressive disorder – whether disorders were "war caused" – diagnosis of disorders – whether the veteran experienced a life threatening event – "exposure to a traumatic event" – "intense fear, helplessness or horror" – "experiencing a severe stressor" – "experienced, witness or was confronted with" – "confronted with" – Tribunal not satisfied that the Veteran has post-traumatic stress disorder – Tribunal not satisfied that the veteran has major depression – decision affirmed
